

Here's what you made happen in Mason County in 2020:


- 340 grants totaling \$1,246,772 were approved for a variety of community projects.
- Mason County's Youth Advisory Council approved 8 grants totaling \$11,232, including classroom project grants at school districts in Mason County.
- 56 Wish List Grants totaling \$49,210 to a variety of nonprofit organizations.
- Awarded scholarships to 114 students, including renewals, which represent commitments over the next four years of \$148,000.
- \$1,943,427 in gifts and grants.
- 395 first-time donors.
- 39 people memorialized with gifts to the Community Foundation.
- Created 4 new named funds, for a total of 175 funds.
- Net assets: \$22,544,606.



- Last year, the Community Foundation expanded the KickStart to Career children's savings account program. In the 2020-2021 school year, a CSA was provided to a second cohort of kindergarten students in Mason County schools with a \$50 savings account and an opportunity for match and incentive dollars. This year, 612 kindergarten and first grade students have saved \$4,788 so far! This money was matched by West Shore Bank, who added \$10 per kindergarten student; by Lake Michigan CPA Services, who added \$10 per first grade student; an anonymous donor, who donated \$3 to every Franklin Elementary School kindergarten and first grade student; and Kelly and Michael Parker of Nader's Motel & Suites, who also matched up to \$20 per Ludington Area Catholic School student.
- The Mason County Promise is in its third year of providing two years of tuition-free education at West Shore Community College to students graduating from Mason County schools with a 2.0 GPA or above. Last year, 220 students were eligible to use the Promise Scholarship, distributing over \$500,000. Of that group, 136 relied on the Promise to pay for classes.
- Our Youth Advisory
 Council (YAC) is made
 up of 14 students from
 local high schools.
 Each fall, they award
 grants to teachers and
 organizations that impact
 young people. In 2020,
 the YAC awarded grants
 to support the expansion




of classroom libraries, foldscopes (photo above, courtesy of Ludington Area Schools), heart rate monitors, reading interventions, and more. They also participated in the Ludington Lake Jump to help raise money for the **Lakeshore Food 4 Kids** program.



• The Mason-Lake Conservation District currently holds a federal grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation to mitigate sediment and nutrient inputs to the Lincoln and Sable Rivers and to improve water quality. A Community Foundation grant was used toward additional match funds for their federal project. This project aims to develop an educational campaign regarding septic system and lawn fertilizer management for landowners around Hamlin Lake and Bass Lake in an effort to minimize toxic algae blooms and other water quality issues.

- The Ludington Police Department was awarded a grant
 to provide funding for officers to attend a three-day training
 course on Spanish-speaking communities. This training
 afforded officers the ability to effectively communicate
 with the Spanish-speaking population of Mason County
 and assist in building bridges between communities.
 Local officers and deputies learned Spanish phrases and
 cultural norms. The overall project goal is to help alleviate
 misunderstandings between local law enforcement and
 members of our Spanish-speaking community.
- The Community Foundation provided a grant to the Village of Custer sculpture project to provide engineering work to improve drainage. This sculpture will be part of the Mason County Sculpture Trail and the Music Trail. It will draw historians and visitors from all over to learn more about our history and heritage.
- A grant was provided to HELP Ministries to build wheelchair ramps and help with minor home repairs. This project will allow better mobility in and out of the homes of handicap or wheelchair-bound residents of all ages in the county. These families often need small home repairs, like grab bars or special railings, to make their residence more user-friendly. Our hope is that the families we are able to help will enjoy a more satisfying life as a result of increased mobility and in-home security.



• As part of philanthropy leadership, the Community Foundation is in its fourth year of inviting area nonprofits to share which near-term projects and purchases need financial support from the community. These wish list ideas span a variety of interest areas and are organized into three funding levels: under \$500, \$500-\$1500, and over \$1500. Last holiday season, the Pennies From Heaven Foundation offered a "Meet Us Halfway" match, covering up to 50% of the cost of each individual wish granted from the first two funding levels. All of the wishes eligible for the match dollars were granted, along with several wishes in the third funding level!





































- Match Day, developed by the Community Foundation in partnership with
 the Pennies from Heaven Foundation and Metalworks, was designed
 to provide operating support for organizations impacted by COVID-19.
 Thanks to YOU, we raised over \$345,000! With a match pool of
 \$106,000, Match Day generated a total of over \$450,000 to support these
 organizations and the important work they're doing in our community.
- The Community Foundation teamed up with the United Way of Mason
 County and the Pennies from Heaven Foundation to create a COVID-19
 Relief Fund to support nonprofits who helped our vulnerable community
 members deal with the fallout of the pandemic. Because of your help,
 along with support from the Consumers Energy Foundation, DTE Energy
 Foundation, and Meijer, over \$100,000 was raised for the fund.
 - + Lakeshore Food Club provided food assistance for families
 - + True North Community Services offered support for rent and housing
 - + The Salvation Army supplied food, rent, and utility support
 - + **Harbor Hospice** launched their Tele-Health program
 - + Mason County Emergency secured housing for essential workers



- Last year, we awarded a grant to Habitat for Humanity for their Neighborhood Revitalization (NR) program. This program is designed to directly impact low-income, owner occupied homes with necessary exterior improvements, including windows, roofing, siding, clean-up, painting, and landscaping. The NR program partnered with the Neighbor 2 Neighbor Volunteer Initiative to recruit additional volunteers and encourage community pride in lending a hand to one another. These NR projects help improve the quality of life to the homeowners, create neighborhood relationships, and increase property values.
- The Community Foundation provided matching funds for the MEDC's Small Business Grants to support local businesses during Michigan's stay-at-home order. The MEDC launched a Small Business Survival grant program, which allocated \$143,899 to Mason County businesses. Grants ranging from \$5,000-\$10,000 were awarded to 20 businesses across Mason County.
- The Community Foundation worked with the county to establish the Complete Count Committee for Mason County. Through a grant from the Michigan Nonprofit Association, we coordinated marketing materials for



area agencies and businesses to promote filling out the Census (photo left/right, courtesy of the Pennies from Heaven Foundation). Along with other local partners, we helped educate and encourage Census participation by informing our community about the process to complete the Census, important dates, and scheduled Census Hubs.



West Michigan Community Mental
 Health implemented the myStrength web
 and mobile-based platform to encourage
 individuals to participate more in their
 own healthcare, increase community wide access to mental health supports,
 and increase overall community wellness.
 WMCMH will be entering into a contract



relationship with myStrength, a behavioral health company that delivers web- and mobile-based self-management tools. This platform is a population health solution that focuses on creating personalized, interactive user experiences that empower individuals to achieve their goals and attain a strong sense of well-being.

- The Community Foundation awarded a grant to West Shore Family Support for their Baby Bucks Boutique (photo left, courtesy of West Shore Family Support). The Boutique provides parents with costly necessities like diapers, wipes, clothing, outerwear, blankets, formula, and more. The Boutique is also stocked with bigger items, including infant car seats, highchairs, and strollers. The Boutique serves families with children 4 years old and younger and those who are expecting.
- Connexion Point was awarded a grant to provide a new gathering space at The Boon House (photo right, courtesy of Connexion Point), which will allow members to participate in recovery programming. This project was a partnership with the Ludington Daily News annual Room Redo project and Cottage Works design team and construction crew.
